NIH's Next Generation Researchers Initiative

Earlier last month, NIH announced plans to balance the biomedical research workforce by using a new measure called the Grant Support Index (GSI) (announcement posted <u>here</u>). As a result of the intense feedback received from the scientific community, NIH announced at the June 8th Advisory Council to the NIH Director its decision to shift its efforts toward a bold, more focused approach to bolster support to early- and mid-career investigators.

The effort, now named the <u>Next Generation Researchers Initiative</u>, will <u>not</u> include the Grant Support Index to adjust the distribution of NIH funds among investigators. However, the initiative will reprioritize funds (\$210M this year and up to \$1.1B per year in five years) to support additional meritorious early-stage and mid-career investigators. These funds will be used as follows:

- Further extending the payline for early stage investigators, with an aim of funding most applications that score in the top 25 percent;
- Providing additional support for mid-career investigators by
 - Extending the payline for those about to lose all NIH funding, and
 - Identifying "rising stars" who are seeking support for their second RPG, but just missed the payline;
- Placing greater emphasis on current NIH funding programs aimed at early-stage and mid-career investigators

To evaluate the effectiveness of this initiative, NIH will continue to track the impact of NIH Institute and Center funding decisions for early-stage and mid-career investigators and also encourage the development and testing of metrics that can be used to assess the impact of NIH grant support on scientific progress. UCSF Weill Institute for Neurosciences 2017 Trailblazer Award Program Deadline for this year's award program is June 16th

The UCSF Weill Institute for Neurosciences brings together world-class researchers with top-ranked physicians to solve some of the most complex challenges in the human brain. The Institute's <u>2017 Trailblazer Award Program</u> seeks to fund compelling, high risk/high reward research in the neurosciences. The target for this program is clinical and translational research focused on a broad spectrum of neuroscience challenges, including therapeutics, diagnostics, imaging technology, biomarker discovery/validation, and computational methods. We seek to support creative research projects that are focused on improved patient outcomes, especially those that employ concepts of convergent neuroscience research, crossing levels of analysis from genomics and imaging to behavior and implementation, and considering the dimension of time. This year the award program will support one-year grants of \$100,000 for individual PI-led projects or \$200,000 for multi-PI projects. We expect to announce the awardees before the end of July. <u>RAP</u>: Resource Allocation Program

The RAP Spring 2017 Cycle - competition is completed!

We received a total of 236 applications competing for funding from 20 funding agencies. Of the 198 applications that went through the RAP review, 86 were funded for a total of \$4,391,430 (43% success rate). 38 applications were reviewed independently by the Diabetes Center and by the Catalyst Program. The Spring Cycle saw an overall increase in well-scored proposal, making the review and award process very competitive. The awardees and full statistics of the Spring Cycle will be posted on the RAP website under "Resources". RAP made the reviews and final scores available to all applicants via the RAP portal. All post-award activities will now be handled by the funding agencies for their specific awardees.

The numbers for the entire academic year 2016-17 show 387 proposals submitted in total. 324 proposals were reviewed by RAP review committees. 63 proposals went through Independent Review (Catalyst and Diabetes). RAP review saw a 46% success rate with 149 awards made, and a total of \$7,129,526 disbursed to faculty and post-doctoral researchers at UCSF and affiliated sites.

Please note for future cycles: A first resubmission is granted automatically to all new submissions that were not funded and wish to resubmit. Second resubmissions are allowed only under review committee approval as specified in the review.

During the summer months, RAP will work with the funding agencies to produce new and revised grant RFAs for the next Call for Applications scheduled for August 21, 2017. The Deadline to submit applications for the Fall Cycle is September 18, 2017 2pm PST.
