WHAT: Greenwall Faculty Scholars Program in Bioethics ([Request for Proposals 2024-2025 - The Greenwall Foundation](#))

PURPOSE:

- To enable early-career faculty members to carry out innovative bioethics research.
- To support research that goes beyond current work in bioethics to help resolve pressing ethical issues in clinical, biomedical, and public health decision-making, policy, and practice, and to create a community that enhances future bioethics research.
- Priority will be given to applicants whose research addresses innovative ideas and/or emerging topics. Lower priority will be given to applicants who are primarily carrying out educational reform or theoretical work with limited applicability to practice, research, or policy.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Applicants must be early-career faculty members at a university or non-profit research institute that has tax-exempt status in the United States.
- Applicants must hold a faculty appointment (or other long-term research position outside a university) that allows at least 50 percent of their effort to perform research (often this is a faculty position with at least a 60 percent appointment in a tenure-track position or its equivalent).
- Priority will be given to applicants who have not yet been considered for tenure or an equivalent promotion; whose research will have an impact on clinical, biomedical, and public health decision-making, policy, and practice; and who will make important contributions to the field of bioethics over their careers.
- Faculty Scholars will be selected on the basis of the strength of their research project, their commitment to the field of bioethics, their achievements, their potential for growth as a bioethics scholar, and support from their home institution, including after the end of this award. While the amount and quality of an applicant's research in bioethics will count favorably towards their application, outstanding candidates with less direct experience in bioethics will also be considered when their proposed work aims to advance the bioethics field.
- The Greenwall Foundation particularly welcomes applicants from backgrounds that are under-represented in bioethics and academia.

BUDGET AND PROJECT PERIOD:

- The award supports 50 percent of a Scholar's salary plus benefits for three years, up to the NIH salary cap, with 10 percent institutional costs for the salary and benefits. This funding is intended to ensure that at least 50 percent of the Scholar's time is devoted to bioethics research.
- In addition, the Foundation provides \$5,000 each year for limited project support and travel (no indirect costs are provided for these items).

1. Limited Submission Pre-proposal Cover Sheet with signatures (form attached to email)
2. Project Summary:
 - a. three-page, single-spaced with one-inch margins and font size no smaller than 12 point, that includes:
 - i. A description of the research proposal, particularly its significance
 - ii. How the research will be carried out and how it is likely to have an impact on clinical, biomedical, and public health decision-making, policy, and practice
 - iii. A personal statement describing the applicant's goals in the field of bioethics
3. NIH Bio-sketch (5-pg. max., including publications)

To qualify for UCSF Limited Submission Program opportunities, applicants must have a paid UCSF appointment either at the time of application or anticipated by the time of award.

The LSP is a selection process, not an award process. As the LSP is under significant time constraints, all reviewer feedback is optional. We encourage you to seek other avenues for proposal feedback.
